We inform families about State standards and our curriculum and assessments, suggest ideas to help parents monitor and support their student's achievement, and educate on the value of parent involvement by:

- Beginning of the year Parent Orientation
- Campus Parent Breakfasts (2 times during the year)
- Weekly Classroom Newsletters/Campus Thursday Exchange Newsletter
- Parent Nights (4 times a year), 6th Grade Course Selection/Middle School Transition Night
- Parent Portal
- Parent Leadership Breakfasts (2 times during the year)
- State required STAAR Assessment Parent Notification (Spring Semester)
- Interpreter available upon request

- District/Campus Parent Surveys (sent out in May)
- 2. Hold parent-teacher conferences (at least annually in elementary schools) as it relates to the individual child's achievement. Specifically, these conferences will be held:
 - Parent-Teacher Conference Half Days (October 21 and April 13)
 - Individual Conferences with Guidance Counselor, Teacher, or Administrator Upon Reguest
 - Annual ARD, 504, LPAC Meetings (If the student receives special services)

- 3. Provide parents with frequent reports on their children's progress. Specifically, the school will provide reports as follows:
 - Class Dojo (As used at the discretion of classroom teachers)
 - Progress Reports sent home every 3rd week of the 9 week period
 - Report cards sent home every 9 weeks
 - Online Parent Portal
 - Annual Confidential Student Reports on State Testing
 - Annual Title 1 Meeting (during Parent Orientation)
- 4. Provide parents reasonable access to staff, opportunities to volunteer, participate in their child's class, and to observe classroom activities, as follows:
 - Parents As Partners
 - District Wide Parenting Program
 - Campus Parent Involvement Activities (Donuts with Dads, Watch DOGS, Grandparents' Day, Fall Carnival, NEHS Dance, Field Trips, Campus Planning Team)
 - Campus Remind
 - Volunteer Month (October)

Parent Responsibilities
